Connecticut's Literary Community Celebrates Notable Authors and Illustrators

MIDDLETOWN, CT - (September 1, 2022) — The 2022 Connecticut Book Awards, a program of the <u>Connecticut Center for the Book</u>, an affiliate program of the <u>Library of Congress</u> and a core program of <u>Connecticut Humanities</u>, will be held at 5:00 p.m. on Sunday, October 23, 2022, at the Hartford Public Library.

The Connecticut Book Awards recognize the best books of 2021 either **about** Connecticut or by authors and illustrators **from** Connecticut. Categories include Fiction, Nonfiction, Poetry, and Books for Young Readers.

Awards will also include the Bruce Fraser "Spirit of Connecticut" Award. This special award is in memory of longtime Connecticut Humanities director Bruce Fraser and celebrates Connecticut's sense of place. Winners of all award categories will be announced at the event.

"We are so excited to bring these authors to the attention of readers both in Connecticut and outside of Connecticut," said Lisa Comstock, director of the Connecticut Center for the Book. "Connecticut is the home of so many talented writers and they have rich stories to tell. We are proud to announce the shortlist finalists."
