Introduction

Connecticut Humanities is a grantmaking organization and technical assistance provider. Through its efforts to support organizations that make history, literature, art, and other humanities disciplines accessible, relevant and interesting, the work of Connecticut Humanities and its

grantees helps to build community, develop strong relationships, and cultivate civic pride. Connecticut Humanities works cooperatively with the CT Department of Economic and Community Development, the CT State Library, the CT State Department of Education, and the CT Secretary of the State, as enabled by the Connecticut General Assembly. State funding is matched by the National Endowment for the Humanities, corporations, and foundations.

HUMANITIES DEFINITION

The humanities are fields of learning that help us understand and appreciate human history, culture, values, and beliefs. They allow us to analyze our complex society and to make thoughtful, reasoned decisions based on inquiry, evaluation, and empathy.

As stated in its promotional materials, Connecticut Humanities has granted more than \$15.7 million to hundreds of organizations statewide, since it was founded in 1975. This support has been augmented by corporate and foundation grants and additional dollars and research from grantee organizations. Through its work and that of its partners and grantees, a total of \$57 million has been invested in quality humanities programming across Connecticut

In 2012, Connecticut Humanities modified its grantmaking strategies and priorities in an effort to streamline processes, attract and retain new grantee organizations, and ensure that all use of grant funds remained focused on the Humanities (see definition in box above). Connecticut Humanities also commissioned a two-part study of its grantmaking covering the three-year period FY 2012 – FY 2014, including a review of applications received and grants made, as well as a grantee survey to obtain direct feedback from recent Connecticut Humanities grantees (copies of reports from both projects are available upon request). During the four-year, FY 2015 through FY 2018, grant period (hereafter 2015-2018), Connecticut Humanities worked through multiple funding challenges connected to Connecticut state budget issues, but was able to maintain grantmaking and provision of technical assistance to its applicant/grantee community.

This grantmaking review was designed to determine the profile of recent grantee organizations, the types of grants administered and levels of support provided, and whether those had changed in comparison to the FY 2012 – FY 2014 grant period (hereafter 2012-2014). It was also designed to provide an update on how grantees use resources and what they accomplish. Key findings are summarized on the next two pages with detailed results following. Results are expected to inform new strategic directions for FY 2020 and beyond.

Findings Summary

Review of Grant-Making

- During 2015-2018, Connecticut Humanities continued to maintain a robust portfolio of grantmaking. Across the 7 grantlines that were the focus of this report, more than \$2.1 million was awarded to 157 organizations to develop and deliver a wide variety of projects to convey humanities themes to public audiences. This represents approximately a 24% increase in total dollars granted **per year** as compared to the 2012-2014 study (on average \$440,815 was granted per year during 2012-2014, the equivalent of \$544,799 per year was granted between 2015-2018). This increase is in alignment with board priorities to ensure that substantial resources are regranted.
- As was true of 2012-2014, Connecticut Humanities awarded grants 2015-2018 to organizations located throughout the state with varying profiles including organizations with both larger and quite small annual budgets and different missions. Many of these organizations (51% of all organizations that applied and 43% of the grantees) had not applied for funding during 2012-2014. During 2015-2018 and, as was also the case for 2012-2014, multiple organizations requested and were awarded grants from more than one grantline. This is also in alignment with board priorities.
- Connecticut Humanities received proposals from different types of organizations including those identified as Art Museums (3%), Arts Organizations (19%), Educational Organizations (8%), Libraries (15%), History Organizations/Museums or Societies (37%) and other nonprofits (18%). This distribution of organizational types for 2015-2018 was very similar to the 2012 2014 period. The types of organizations that were awarded grants was very similar across the two periods.
- Substantial proportions (64%) of all grant requests were awarded and most organizations (72%) that applied received at least one grant during 2015-2018. Almost all StEPs-CT Grant requests, (95%.) were funded as well as six of seven 1818 Grant request (86%), and all seven Connecticut at Work Grants (2015 only). A total of 9 of 14 Capacity Building Grants (64%), 63% of all Quick Grant requests, 65% of all Planning Grant requests and 51 of 107 Implementation Grant requests (48%) were funded.
- As in 2012-2014, most grants awarded were funded in full. All Capacity Building and Connecticut at Work Grants that were accepted were fully funded and this was also true for all but one of the 1818 Grants, and 94% of the StEPs-CT Grants. More than two-thirds of all Quick Grants (71%) were fully funded as were about half of the larger Planning (54%) and Implementation (45%) Grants.
- About one-quarter of the grantees (24%) obtained grants for amounts between \$100 and \$1500, almost half (43%) obtained grants for amounts between \$1501 and \$9,999 and 52 grantees (33%) obtained grants for \$10,000 or more. This represents a definite shift: during the 2012-2014 grant period, only 20% of grantees obtained grants at the highest level. ¹
- Similar to 2012-2014, there were grantees of different organizational types and in each budget size category that obtained each of the types of grants, and there were some disparities. But unlike the prior grant period, the disparities were most pronounced by budget size, not organizational type. Grantees with larger budgets disproportionately obtained the larger Implementation Grants (those obtaining Quick Grants were completely representative). The differences may continue to signify that grantees are able to find the right grant options for their needs and capacity, that there continues to be needed flexibility within the grantlines, and that there is an ongoing need to review any disparities in grant acquisition.

Review of Selected Grantee Final Reports (2 from each grant line)

The Project Narrative reports ask grantees to answer a series of questions that provide an update on how grant funds were spent and what was accomplished. These reports are brief, but they cover multiple key elements of grantee work. They serve to provide final documentation about challenges and accomplishments of the projects for both Connecticut Humanities and the grantees which can further inform future grantmaking and project development decisions. Each report is carefully reviewed by the Manager of Grants and Programs and requests for additional details are made if needed. The report structure (7 – 10 open-ended questions) facilitates individual reporting by grantees in accordance with grant size/complexity, as well as comparison of overall results by grantline. Review of eight randomly selected reports highlighted project results; all included summaries of positive project outcomes. The selected reports, especially the Capacity Building, Public Presentation: Planning and Public Presentation: Implementation reports featured many details and insights about the selected projects. The reports guide reflection on accomplishments and encourage grantees to assess challenges too, and as such they are useful to both Connecticut Humanities and the grantees. More details, especially regarding any project difficulties would further enhance reporting usefulness.

<u>Issues for Further Consideration and Suggested Action Steps</u>

- Connecticut Humanities is strongly encouraged to carefully review this report and share findings with key stakeholders, specifically to determine whether grantmaking volume and grantee diversity is sufficient.
- > The differences in grant access may signify that grantees continue to be able to find the right grant options for their potential and that there is needed flexibility within the grantlines. The diversity within grantlines may also suggest that there is ongoing disparity regarding grant acquisition that should remain the subject for continued review. Despite disparities, both smaller and larger organizations, and multiples types of organizations acquired grants in each grantline.
- Review of final reports highlighted possible areas to strengthen:
 - ▶ Encouraging the incorporation of additional details in the reports as needed: such as attachments of basic counts and descriptions of program visitors/participants, and clarification of at least one way that the grantee assessed project success or participant benefits. Strive for concrete versus abstract findings.
 - ▶ Brainstorming and reporting about how to address areas of projects that fall short of expectations. Consider using a close-ended item asking grantees to rate the level of difficulty they experienced with common program challenges such as staffing or space problems, smaller audience than desired, more time needed for planning or initiation.
- Review of project titles and a small sample of randomly selected reports showed that requirements have resulted in multiple projects operating to convey important humanities themes. Attention to this accomplishment should always be continued.

I: Profile of Applicants and Grantees, 2015 - 2018

Connecticut Humanities received applications across multiple grantlines during 2015 through 2018, seven of which are the subject of this review. More than \$2.1 million was awarded to 157 organizations to develop and deliver a wide variety of projects to convey humanities themes to public audiences. Connecticut Humanities' applicants/grantees are located throughout the state. They have varying organizational profiles including organizations with both larger and quite small annual budgets, and different missions. While CTH has been a grantmaker for almost 50 years, it continues to both attract first time grantees and to retain relationships with those who are repeat grantees. During the 2015-2018 grant period, multiple organizations requested and received awards in multiple grantlines.

Table 1 and figures 1, 2 and 3 (following) present descriptive information about organizations that applied for and were awarded grants during 2015-2018 (see appendix for additional comparative data from 2012 – 2014). Connecticut Humanities continued to maintain a robust portfolio of grantmaking. This report focuses on seven grantlines during 2015-2018 including: **Capacity Building Grants, Public Presentation - Planning Grants, Public Presentation - Implementation Grants, Quick Grants**, CT at Work Grants (2015 only), 1818 Grants (2018 only), and StEPs-CT Grants (through 2017). The final section of the report focuses only on the four primary grantlines for each of the four fiscal years (those highlighted in bold text). As shown in Table 1, 218 organizations applied for funding and 157 were awarded grants.

- Close to half (43%) of the 2015-2018 grantee organizations applied only in 2015-2018 but not in the previous grant cycle. (Note that 44 or 72% of the 61 unsuccessful organizations had applied only during 2015-2018, 17 unsuccessful applicants applied in both cycles).
- About one-third of the grantees (33%) applied for only one grant during 2015-2018, but most (67%) applied for and received more than one. This represents a big shift from 2012-2014 where only 40% of grantees applied for more than one grant.





• About one-quarter of the grantees (24%) obtained grants for amounts between \$100 and \$1500, a sizeable group (43%) obtained grants for amounts between \$1501 and \$9,999, and about one-third of the grantees (33%) obtained grants for \$10,000 or more. As shown in Figure 1, proportionally more grantees acquired larger grants during the 2015-2018 grant period, and proportionally fewer acquired smaller grants.




• As during the 2012-2014 grant period, Connecticut Humanities continued to receive proposals from and fund different types of organizations identified into 6 categories (see Figure 2 below). The composition of the grantee group was very similar across the two grant periods. The largest group of grantees (n=70, 45%) continued to be organizations identified as History Museums or Societies (see Appendix for additional information about all applicant organizations and a full list of grantee organizations for each grantline).



Note that only 501c3 organizations and municipalities are eligible to be grantees. This limits in some ways the types of organizations that can apply for funding.

• Connecticut Humanities continued to provide funding for organizations with budget sizes ranging from less than \$250,000 to \$2.5 million or more per anum. For 2015-2018, as for the previous grant period, the largest group of grantees were those in the smallest budget category. As shown in Figure 3, a total of 38% had annual budgets less than \$250,000; 23% had annual budgets between \$250,000 and \$849,999; 16% had annual budgets between \$850,000 and \$2,499,999; and 23% had annual budgets of \$2.5 million or more. Grantees and their programs were located throughout the state, particularly along the coast and in the central and western regions (see Figure 4).





II. Grants Administered and Levels of Support, 2015 - 2018

Connecticut Humanities provided more than \$2.1 million in grants across the grantlines and years that are the focus of this study (2015-2018). Substantial proportions of all grants that were requested were awarded and most organizations that applied received grants. The grantlines varied in terms of the number of grants made and the number of organizations applying for and receiving grants. Public Presentation Grants and Quick Grants were applied for and awarded to the largest numbers of organizations. The largest total awards were those with the highest ceiling; the Public Presentation Grants (for planning and implementation).

Table 2 and Tables 3a and 3b (following) provide additional details regarding grantmaking volume 2015-2018. As shown in Table 2, a total of 465 applications were received from 218 distinct organizations. A total of 296 (64%) of the applications were funded. These grant awards totaling \$2,179,194 accrued to 157 grantees, 72% of all organizations that applied. Tables 2 and 3c also show that not all grants were fully funded.

• Twice as much funding was requested across all applications received (\$4,427,416,) than was awarded (total awards = \$2,179,194, 49%). A total of 61 of the 218 organizations that submitted applications were not awarded any grants in 2015-2018 (28%). The remaining 157 organizations requested \$3,901,236 of which \$2,179,194 (56%) was funded.

Tables 3a, 3b and 3c show grantmaking volume for 2015-2018 by grantline.² It can be seen in the tables that multiple grants were made in each grantline. Grant data also show that many organizations made applications for more than one grantline in more than one year and the outcomes of their applications varied both in terms of whether they were awarded a grant and whether the grant award was for the full amount requested. By design, the largest awards were for Public Presentation-Implementation grants and the smallest for Quick Grants. All Capacity Building and Connecticut at Work Grants that were accepted were fully funded and this was also true for all but one of the 1818 Grants. Slightly more than half (54%) of all Public Presentation-Planning Grants were fully-funded as were about half of the Public Presentation-Implementation grants (45%). Most of the Quick Grants (71%) and StEPs-CT Grants (95%) were fully-funded

Table 4 shows information about grantees' annual budget size and organization type for the four primary grantlines (Capacity Grants, Public Presentations – Planning, Public Presentations – Implementation, and Quick Grants).³ The analysis shows, in the aggregate, which types of organizations take advantage of the available resources. It can be seen in the table that different types of grantee organizations received funding for the different grantlines. Most Capacity Grants grantees were larger organizations (i.e., budget size - \$850,000/year or more) as were most Public Presentation – Implementation grantees; most Quick Grants grantees were smaller organizations. It is noteworthy that there are organizations in each of the size categories that obtained each of the types of grants – for example 15% f the organizations obtaining Implementation grants were smaller organizations with budget sizes less than \$250,000.

Types of organizations also varied by grantline but here too there was at least some representation of almost every type of organization in each grantline. Most of the organizations that obtained Public Presentation - Planning grants were History Museum/Societies. History Museum/Societies were the most represented among grantees overall, but they are especially prevalent among Public Presentation - Planning Grants grantees and among organizations applying for Quick grants (the latter finding represents a shift from the prior grant period, see Appendix 4). With the exception of Educational Organizations and Libraries not receiving Capacity grants, all grantlines were obtained by all the different types of grantees. Specific findings follow the table.

A total of 4% of the organizations are Art Museums, 15% are Arts Organizations, 9% are Educational Organizations, 45% are History/Museum/Societies, 15% are Libraries, and 13% were categorized as other. **Note also that only 501c3 organizations and municipalities are eligible to be grantees**.

- A total of 22% of Capacity Grant grantees had annual budget sizes <\$250,000; 22% had annual budget sizes ranging between \$250,000 and \$849,999; 44% had annual budget sizes ranging between \$850,000 and \$2,499,999; and 11% had budgets totaling \$2.5 million or more. This distribution is different from the overall distribution of grantees. Both those with the smallest and the largest budgets are under-represented.
- A total of 23% of Public Presentation- Planning grantees had annual budget sizes <\$250,000; 15% had annual budget sizes ranging between \$250,000 and \$849,999; 23% had annual budget sizes ranging between \$850,000 and \$2,499,999; and 39% had budgets totaling \$2.5 million or more. Smaller organizations were also under-represented in this group (they make up 38% of the total population of grantees but only 23% of those that obtained planning grants); and those with budgets totaling 2.5 million or more were over-represented.
- A total of 15% of Public Presentation Implementation grantees had annual budget sizes <\$250,000; 27% had annual budget sizes ranging between \$250,000 and \$849,999; 24% had annual budget sizes ranging between \$850,000 and \$2,499,999; and 34% had budgets totaling \$2.5 million or more. Larger organizations were over-represented in this group (they make up 39% of all grantees in the review, but 58% of those with implementation grant awards).
- A total of 33% of Quick Grant grantees had annual budget sizes <\$250,000; 27% had annual budget sizes ranging between \$250,000 and \$849,999; 17% had annual budget sizes ranging between \$850,000 and \$2,499,999; and 23% had budgets totaling \$2.5 million or more. The overall composition of Quick Grant grantees was very similar to that of the overall grantee population.
- Almost all of the Capacity Grant grantees were classified as History Museums/Societies. No Educational organizations or Libraries obtained a Capacity Grant.
- A total of 4% of Public Presentation Planning grantees were classified as Art Museums, 8% were
 Arts Organizations, 12% were Educational organizations, 62% were History Museums/Societies,
 4% were libraries and 12% were classified as "other." While there was some representation from
 each type of grantee organization, most Planning Grant grantees were History/Museums/
 Societies.
- A total of 7% of Public Presentation Implementation grantees were classified as Art Museums, 20% were Arts Organizations, 10% were Educational organizations, 46% were History/ Museums/Societies, 7% were libraries and 10% were classified as "other." As shown, all different types of grantees were able to benefit from these larger grants.
- A total of 5% of Quick Grants grantees were classified as Art Museums, 15% were Arts
 Organizations, 7% were Educational organizations, 45% were History Museums/Societies, 17%
 were libraries and 11% were classified as "other." As for the Implementation grants, all different
 types of grantees were able to benefit from these smaller grants, including increasingly, the
 History/Museum/Societies.

The differences shown in Table 4 may signify that grantees continue to be able to find the right grant options for their potential and that there is needed flexibility within the grantlines (hence for example, both very large and very small organizations are able to obtain Implementation grants, albeit of differing dollar amounts). And while these results continue to verify that there is grantee diversity in the grantlines, the results may also suggest that there is ongoing disparity regarding grant acquisition that should remain the subject for continued review.

III. 2015 - 2018 Grantmaking Results and Grantee Use of Resources

Grantees are required to complete two reports in disposition of their grant-funded projects: Project Narrative and Financial Final Report. As a final step in the evaluation of grantmaking 2015-2018, two Project Narrative reports from each of the primary grantlines (Public Presentation – Planning, Public Presentation – Implementation, Capacity Building and Quick Grants) were selected for review. These reports provided additional details and examples of the work that was undertaken by Connecticut Humanities Grantees during this fiscal period (see also the full list of project titles in the appendix for additional examples of grant-funded work) and they also shed light on the reporting process. The eight reports were randomly selected and include the following.

The Project Narrative reports ask grantees to answer a series of questions (see appendix) that provide an update for Connecticut Humanities on how grant funds were spent and what was accomplished. These reports are brief, but they cover multiple key elements of grantee work (see questions following). They serve to provide final documentation about challenges and accomplishments of the projects for both Connecticut Humanities and the grantees which can further inform future grantmaking and project development decisions. Each report is carefully reviewed by the Manager of Grants and Programs and requests for additional details are made if needed. As stated above, completed/approved reports lead to final disposition of the project. The report structure (7 – 10 open-ended questions) facilitates individual reporting by grantees in accordance with grant size/complexity, as well as comparison of overall results by grantline.

⁴ Connecticut Humanities continues to receive and review applications and make awards at multiple times during the fiscal year. Grantees apply for grants during the cycle that best fits their project design.

Quick Grant Report Review Findings

Results of the two Quick Grants were largely positive, but lacking in some key details. Specifically:

- Both grantees indicated they changed their programs from the original application. One used a different presenter, the other added an activity.
- Both grantees reported they successfully conveyed the main concepts stated in their applications, but their findings lacked detail. One grantee indicated they used a survey to capture data to answer this question, the other reported using a pre-post assessment. Neither gave any details on how many individuals were surveyed or percentages providing desirable answers. One grantee summarized that the results were favorable and that audience members wanted "more" programming, but no numerical results were included.
- Both grantees reported they followed their original promotional/publicity plans.
- One grantee indicated they had mixed results regarding attracting targeted audiences and surmised it was due to timing of the events. The other grantee reported they succeeded in attracting their targeted audiences (however no additional details were provided).
- Both grantees were able to identify especially successful elements of their programs.
- Grantees' responses to the question about what did not meet expectations were particularly weak. For example: in response to the question: What aspects of your program did not meet your expectations? one grantee's answer was: *Increased attendance was the only negative, but we did have many new faces in attendance.*

Capacity Building Report Review Findings

Results of the two Capacity Building reports were also positive. These reports featured more details and insights regarding capacity building work. Specifically:

- Both grantees provided many details regarding their capacity building processes clarifying that multiple staff/stakeholders had been involved, that the work was intensive and how outside consultants had been used. Both grantees also reported efforts for more permanent or long-term capacity development.
- Both grantees clearly described the goals of their projects: one grantee added an additional goal, the other stuck to the goals in their original plan.
- One of the grantees reporting meeting most of their strategic planning goals and was able to adopt their plan through the project. The other grantee had a major problem meeting their goals according to their original timeline as the consultant they engaged ran into timing challenges. A compromise was reached and goals were eventually met.
- Both grantee organizations reported that much of their work ran smoothly, but each also
 described some limitations. The grantee working on the strategic plan indicated they
 were not able to get as much local input as they would have liked. The other grantee
 indicated that in addition to the consultant's timing challenges there was also staff
 resistance to taking on the new interpretation strategies promoted by the grant. Both

- grantees described the challenges in detail indicating they understood why their projects fell short and how they might be able to address the shortfalls in the future.
- Both grantees also provided clear details about their plans to use the results of their capacity building work and to monitor ongoing progress.
- Both grantees expected impediments to be minor: staff resistance in the case of the group working on new interpretation strategies, and some concern that volunteers and local community members might experience some challenges due to the cultural changes that the planning is expected to bring about.
- Both grantees identified working with effective consultants as advice they would share with other grantees. (Note that one grantee worked with two consultants, one whose timing challenges created some problems, but whose expertise was very useful, and a second consultant who was a great fit in terms of expertise and style and timing.)

Public Presentation: Planning Report Review Findings

Like the reports about the Capacity Building grants, the two reports detailing results of the Public Presentation: Planning were positive and specific. Although both lacked answers to some of the questions, they were both mostly complete and highlighted the usefulness of the planning grants. Specifically:

- Both grantees agreed the planning process helped them to discover potential humanities themes and appropriate formats to interpret themes for their intended audiences. For example, one grantee used the planning time to organize multiple themes/areas of interest, into three key themes, with the help of a consultant. That work lead to new and critical research, strategizing and concept development. The other grantee used the planning time to expand their view of key themes which was described as integral to the project and lead to enhanced exhibition planning and exposure of previously unpublished works in the exhibition's catalogue.
- The process of planning changed the scope of the work for both grantees, changing the timeline for one, and refocusing the work through multiple humanities lenses for the other.
- Both grantee organizations indicated they used external scholars effectively.
- One of the grantees used the planning project to develop a more incremental
 implementation plan to include an additional pilot phase. The other grantee used the
 planning time and modification in focus to develop new programming designed for new
 audiences and presenting more of a mix of themes presenting the subject as a collector
 and a person in addition to being an artist.
- Both grantee organizations were able to identify challenges they will potentially face
 when their organizations work to implement their plans. The organization that expanded
 their focus is concerned about finding the right combination of narratives, objects and
 images, and the organization that honed in on three themes expressed concern that the
 breadth, depth and intricacy of the work will bring additional financial resource
 challenges.

- Interestingly, both grantees reported that ongoing marketing plans had been developed, but neither provided any projections about how the marketing would increase their institution's visibility or visitation.
- Regarding aspects of their planning work that fell short of expectations, the group that
 clarified and simplified their focus reported that timing was their major challenge. They
 reported that planning work in each of the three theme areas took longer than expected
 and as a result needed an extension for their project.. The grantee organization that
 expanded their focus reported that logistics were trickier and costs were more than they
 expected. Neither group provided a response to the question of what they could have
 done differently.
- Only one grantee answered the question about suggestions for others. That organization recommended that outside consultants were key, especially to help frame the themes and to provide varied perspectives.

Public Presentation: Implementation Report Review Findings

The two reports detailing results of the Public Presentation: Implementation work were positive and informative. One of the grantees used especially effective evaluation strategies and was therefore especially able to clarify results of their work. Both grantees reported the projects resulted in engagement with key and new stakeholders and while only one grantee had project-related activities that continued beyond the grant period, both described their work as successful and offered suggestions for others as well.

- Both grantees provided details about their format and approach to their work. The scope of the two projects was very different (one included three live conversation series programs with audiences ranging between 21 and 45 persons; the other grant was for a summer exhibition project that included programming components in multiple organizations taking place during peak season with large and increased numbers of visitors totaling 26,000).
- Both grantee organizations reported they met their goals, but the more modest program included more general statements, references to a survey and informal observations. Specific details were more limited. For example, the grantee reported that there was repeat attendance (on average 60% of audience members reported attending in the past), and that new supporters continued to be attracted to the organization (no specific outcome was reported). The grantee also reported programs often ran over their allotted time and that the guests experienced an onslaught of audience members rushing to introduce themselves and continue talking, but no exact details were included. The organization with the larger project included use of exit surveys and intercept surveys that had items about learning and opinions. They were able to report very specific outcome statements such as: Most visitors (58%) indicated they learned something new about history.
- Both grantees reported that their projects successfully conveyed humanities themes based on the feedback they got from participants through conversations and surveys.

- Both grantees were able to describe their promotional and publicity efforts and to
 identify what had been most successful. The grantee with the smaller project indicated
 that direct marketing had been most successful and they knew because they asked at
 events and then checked followers on Facebook. The grantee with the larger project
 clarified that their surveys showed that newspaper ads had been most instrumental in
 bringing in visitors.
- The grantee with the smaller project reported an exact number of visitors and was able to clarify how many of the participants were new to the program or repeat visitors. They also reported that this information helped them to expand their mailing list and increase membership, but they did not clarify whether the number met previously determined targets. The larger project reported that attendance at 25,960 had surpassed the goal of 25,000 for the four-month period and represented an increase over total attendance for the same period during the prior year. Additionally, their exit surveys helped them further clarify that they had reached their specific target audiences of art enthusiasts (8.45 out of 10 visitors) and maritime history buffs (5.33 out of 10 visitors).
- Both grantees were also clear that their projects lead to particularly important outcomes. Participation in the programs of the smaller project resulted in new visitors and new memberships. For the larger project the grant helped them to enhance the diversity and caliber of programming that was available to their many visitors over the summer.
- The grantee with the larger project also reported they were able to continue providing some activities after the grant period by having developed an online learning tool that was posted to the website and is now continuously available.
- Both organizations also used the report to detail some aspects of their projects that fell short of expectations. For the smaller project there were some scheduling challenges and their was internal turnover that delayed some planned programming. For the larger project, some initially requested funds were not made available so a proposed video was not developed.
- Both grantee organizations used the reports to clarify what they could have done
 differently including using a dedicated program manager at the organization with the
 smaller project, and incorporating more time into specific components of the larger
 project.
- Both organizations also offered advice for others including a reminder to plan and budget for change (smaller project), and to maximize cross-marketing/multi-partner collaborations (larger project).

These summaries exemplify the value of the reports to highlight project results. As reported in the grantee survey, the reports are relatively easy to complete and they guide reflection on accomplishments and challenges so that they are useful to both Connecticut Humanities and their grantees. To the degree that this small sample of reports also exemplifies the work of typical grantees they also show that the grants lead to successful projects.

IV. Issues for Further Consideration

Connecticut Humanities is strongly encouraged to carefully review this report and share findings with key stakeholders, specifically to determine whether grantmaking volume and grantee diversity is sufficient.

- ➤ The differences in grant access may signify that grantees continue to be able to find the right grant options for their potential needs and capacity and that there is needed flexibility within the grantlines. The diversity within grantlines may also suggest that there is ongoing disparity regarding grant acquisition that should remain the subject for continued review. Despite disparities, both smaller and larger organizations, and multiples types of organizations acquired grants in each grantline.
 - ► Capacity Building Grants were mostly used by organizations with mid-range budgets. Those with the smallest and largest budgets were somewhat under-represented.
 - ► Smaller organizations were under-represented among those that accessed Public Presentation: Planning Grants; and those organizations with budgets totaling 2.5 million or more were somewhat over-represented.
 - ► Smaller organizations were under-represented among those that accessed Public Presentation: Implementation Grants; and those organizations with budgets totaling 2.5 million or more were somewhat over-represented.
 - ► The overall composition of Quick Grant grantees was very similar to that of the overall grantee population.
 - ▶ No Educational organizations or Libraries obtained a Capacity Grant.
 - ▶ While there was some representation from each type of grantee organization, most Planning Grant grantees were History/Museums/ Societies.
 - ▶ All different types of grantees were able to benefit from the larger Implementation Grants.
 - ▶ All different types of grantees were able to benefit from the smaller Quick Grant grants, including increasingly, the History/Museum/Societies.
- Review of final reports highlighted possible areas to strengthen:
 - ▶ Encouraging the incorporation of additional details in the reports as needed: such as attachments of basic counts and descriptions of program visitors/participants, and clarification of at least one way that the grantee assessed project success or participant benefits. Strive for concrete versus abstract findings.
 - ▶ Brainstorming and reporting about how to address areas of projects that fall short of expectations. Consider using a close-ended item asking grantees to rate the level of difficulty they experienced with common program challenges such as staffing or space problems, smaller audience than desired, more time needed for planning or initiation.
- Review of project titles and a small sample of randomly selected reports showed that requirements have resulted in multiple projects operating to convey important humanities themes. Attention to this accomplishment should always be continued.
