
## THE 2021 NONPROFIT CONNECTICUT CULTURAL CENSUS

## **TYPES OF CT CULTURAL ORGANIZATIONS**



"Other cultural nonprofits" includes cultural service organizations, schools of the arts, cultural series and festivals, cinema, and other media.

In 2021, despite pandemic concerns, we hosted visitors, engaged people in virtual programming, and educated schoolchildren ...throughout the state.
